

<u>Moral</u>

The moral of a story is the life lesson readers learn. Readers learn the lesson by thinking about how the characters act and how they solve problems. To work out the moral, ask yourself:

"What is the important lesson I should for this?"

"How does this story help me to know how to act?"

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Connecting When an idea reminds us of something we know or that has happened to us, this is called connecting. Great readers make connections to what they are reading.

They think, "What does this remind me of?" "How does this story apply to me and the things I do?"
